Repeat a number of times.


Ask the Lord's Spirit to open up your heart and mind as you kneel, sit or stand in your quiet space.

The wise men gave gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh: help us this year to give You our thanks as a gift for coming into this world. Amen





Nativity Scene

This model Nativity is great fun to make, and a good way to remember what happened at the very first Christmas.

For the stable, you will need
A shoebox (or other small cardboard box).
Scissors
Thin twigs
Glue
Wool


Cut the flaps off the box. Lay the box on its side, and carefully cut off the top at an angle, as shown.





Cut square holes in the two sides, so that just a basic frame is left. Then take your twigs, pull off any leaves and wipe off any dirt.

Snap the twigs to the length you need, and glue them inside the back of the box. Then glue more twigs over the side pieces of the frame.





Measure between A and B on your box and break several twigs to this length. Glue them side by side to make the roof, and glue this onto the box when it's dry.

To make the manger, fold a small piece of cardboard in half, and glue two twigs in a criss-cross at each end. You could use some lengths of yellow wool to make the hay, or use real hay or straw.



Making the Figures To make the figures, mix up some home-made salt dough.

Bake the figures in the oven and paint them with poster paints when they are cool. A little varnish will then protect the paint.




3. Roll a thick sausage of dough for the body. Roll thin sausages for the arms and use small balls for hands.




- 2. Roll a bigger ball for the head, and a tiny blob for the nose. Press in a pencil to make the eyes and mouth.
- 1. Cut a thin rectangle of dough to make the headdress. Drape it over the head and body





until they're well mixed.

2 Knead the dough for about two minutes until it's really smooth and stretchy. Put it in a plastic bag in the fridge for half an hour before using.



- 5. Add any extra features, then stand the figures on foil on a baking trav.
 - 4. Put in a cool oven 120°C/Gas Mark 1. It will take them about three hours to dry out. Paint and varnish when cool.



Make hair for an angel by pushing dough through a garlic press. After baking the figure, glue on a cardboard halo and wings, and paint them gold

Make a hole through one of the shepherds' hands with a skewer before baking. Later, add a crook made from a pipe cleaner.



Make sheep from sausages and balls of dough. Make their backs

fleecy by roughening with a fork before you bake them.



This king has a crown, and a beard made from dough. His gift is made from a small cube of salt dough.

The baby Jesus is made from a sausage and ball of dough
