### Never heard of him!

AT Foundry Lane School, aged 11, I was in a group of children who had to pick out a famous person

from a hat, research and then write about him or her.

Before it was my turn, other pupils had picked out the likes of Lord Nelson and Florence Nightingale. I was secretly hoping the name Bobby Charlton, England's football star of the time, would come my way. I put my hand into the hat, picked out a piece of paper ... opened it up ... and it was ... William Wilberforce.

What horror! William Wilberforce!! Never heard of him!!!

I did knuckle down though and produced the piece of work and ended up actually being impressed with Wilberforce. Since then, I've read and seen documentaries and consider him now as one of the 'greats' who made such a valuable contribution during his life.

He was, of course, instrumental in abolishing the Slave Trade in the British Empire in 1807 and finally saw his bill pass into law as the Slavery Abolition Act three days before he died in 1838.

Fast forward into the 21<sup>st</sup> century and we have Modern Slavery, a scourge that has and continues to blight many people today. The Salvation Army website has an informative page on Modern Slavery which is worth looking at. There is a real issue with this problem here in the UK. However, into this darkness there is a light. Jesus said, 'I am the light of the world, whoever walks with Me will not walk in darkness.' John 8:12

May His light shine into these areas of injustice, wrongdoing, and unholiness. And may He use us, in the power of His Spirit, to pray, to speak up, to act, or even all three! To help to bring the light and freedom of Christ into the lives of those caught up as modern day slaves.



Please do have a browse, if you haven't done so already, and if you have any questions on any of the subjects, *please do ask*.


