What's in a Name?

MY AUNTIE EDIE was a little, short lady; her grey hair was kept back from her soft face with old fashioned combs and pinned into a loose bun just above her collar at the back. She hobbled round her tiny bungalow and made delicious jam sponges.

Imagine my shock, my consternation, to meet, when I worked in school, a five year old called Edie. It just wasn't . . . right!

But very quickly this new little Edie, with her sunny disposition and her brown plaits bouncing on her shoulders as she laughed and played with her friends, was just as much 'Edie' to me as my Auntie had been, because a name takes on the character of the person it belongs to.

The Bible has many names for God. One is not enough to express His attributes which are so rich and deep. Bible characters, over the centuries, out of their experiences, have called God different names and this has been the subject of our recent sermon series.

*Moses* proclaimed, 'God is my banner!' (Jehovah Nissi) - we are on God's winning team! *Hagar* called Him, 'the God who sees me' (El Roi) - God knows us inside out and loves us just the same!

*King David* knew God as His rock (YahwehTsuri), constant, strong and powerful, and also his refuge (Jehovah Maakhsi), God protects us, **He** is in control, not the storms that rage around and within us.

Then *Gideon* powerfully came to know God as Jehovah Shalom, God my Peace. In His presence Gideon's fears melted away.

It's true to say, these names, and there are many more, are so much more than nicknames for God. No, He completely embodies them, they are His essence, His very being. So put your trust in the God who sees and loves you and you will find Him to be your rock, your refuge, your banner and your deep peace.

# Terrific response to our



WE set aside a date for a Gift Day on 2<sup>nd</sup> February. As most of our readers are aware, the church roof is in its season of old age after over 100 years and the long term solution is to have a new one and not to keep patching it up as we have been doing in recent times.

We knew having a new roof would not come cheaply and after carefully considering the quotes given to us, the sum we knew we were aiming for was £28,000.

From our funds, we were able to allocate £10,000, leaving a gap of £18,000 to find. Hence, the first step was to ask folk if they would be willing to make a donation on a Gift Day.

We prayed about it, knowing that the Lord has always met our needs in the past and so we stepped out in faith that He would provide again this time.

2<sup>nd</sup> February came. Donations were made in the offertory box and money arrived in our account via bank transfers. And to date a staggering £12,080 has been received. We are deeply grateful to everyone who has given in any way and a special thank you to those who have given unsparingly and sacrificially. We are also indebted to Paintpots and the Impact Church for their generous donations.

So, the gap narrowed to £6,000. A number of our folk who give regularly pay tax on their earnings. This means we are able to make a claim to HMRC under the Gift Aid scheme. A claim has recently been sent in for the last fifteen months and the amount expected will be for over £6,000!

£10,000 + £12,080 + £6,000 = £28,080! God is very, very good!

# **The Thompson Memorial Hall**

FOLLOWING the untimely death of Revd. Jimmy Thompson in December 1962, after a motorcycle accident, the Southern Daily Echo's headline was 'No Minister, no Manse, no Money'.

The following year the two existing halls on the site were considered unsafe by the council and were ordered to be demolished within two years. An estimated cost for a new purpose built hall was £7,000. How much would a new hall cost today with the same amenities?

Norman Savage, Anita Pike's uncle, was the Treasurer of the Thompson Memorial Hall Fund. He said, 'We had fayres and jumble sales, concerts, parties with an admission fee and a Gift Day.' He recalls that it was the concerts that he remembered most. The pastor at the time, John Ovey could sing and play the piano. There was also the Savage orchestra when Norman, his brother Tony and his wife Sue played their violins, and his dad played the viola.

There was a Turkish market which the Mayor came to open and Anita, who was four or five then, presented her with a bouquet of flowers. Anita learnt how to curtsy for the occasion.

With bursaries and loans as well and a generous gift from Mrs Thompson, the hall was able to be built and work started in 1967. When the hall was opened 200 people crowded inside for a dedication service. It was a very proud day for the church.

Malcolm Green commented 'The night before the opening I remember standing inside [the hall] and touching the walls thinking 'I can't believe

it's actually happened. It was truly God answering our prayers.'
